Thank you Dean Broome, esteemed faculty, support staff, friends, families, and graduates. As introduced, my name is Leslie Jo Mitchell, and I am honored and proud to be here with all of you.

Most speeches of this sort, start off with a joke, something witty, a cute opening line, but because I will be graduating with a Master's in *Nursing Education*, I'd like to start off with a pop quiz. What did you expect?

No worries, though, it's open book, you can phone a friend, and I promise to grade on a curve. You'll do fine.

OK, Question 1: Who in the room is here today *in support* of a nursing graduate? May I have a show of hands?

Question 2: Is there anyone here who is proud, very proud of a graduate here today? I thought so.

Question 3: Who thinks that Duke University School of Nursing has helped create some of the finest nurses in the industry? [after hands raised] Right you are. Great job. A +s for everyone.

Here's a bonus question for you: Why are we all here?

When you look around the room, seeing all the smiles, hugs, and tears of joy, it would seem obvious. We are all here to celebrate graduation and celebrate our accomplishments. We're here in this beautiful place to say hi to our friends, some of whom are study buddies we only know from online projects. We can shake some hands, take some happy pictures in our outfits and post them online. This is a day for celebrating all that we've done in our time here at DUSON.

But what I mean is, why are we all *here,* here specifically at Duke University? I would imagine, we choose Duke School of Nursing for many different reasons. I happen to know there are students among us who have started families, changed jobs, moved to other countries, studied from abroad, deployed with the military, and still, somehow, have had the gumption and dedication to get through this.

Mind you, as truly talented and amazing as *this* graduate group is here today, we did not get here on our own. There were spouses, partners, siblings, parents, grand-parents, great-grandparents, friends, faculty, advisors, and probably a few sympathetic supervisors out there that helped this educational dream become a reality.

So when you look back at all the sacrifices we've made, we must also realize what we've gained. That's the good stuff. We've gained new friendships, new connections, and a new direction. We are empowered to do big and amazing things with the knowledge and skills we now possess.
