Clinical Skills Educators, Clinical Skills Training Immersion Course

The Clinical Skills Training Immersion Course is a 2-week program designed to introduce first year medical students to clinical medicine and basic clinical skills. The course will begin on August 8, 2022 and conclude on August 19, 2022. The course will consist of a combination of large group and small group sessions plus the use of offline activities. The goals of the course are to teach the students basic clinical skills and the structure of the medical evaluation (history, physical exam, documentation, presentations). As part of the process, the students will need to learn the basics of clinical reasoning and evidence-based medicine. It is expected that this will enhance their participation in the first-year clinical correlations embedded in first-year curriculum.

Clinical Skills Educators will report to the Course Director, Dr. Julian Hertz. The primary responsibilities of the Clinical Skills Educators will be:

- Leading small group sessions with medical students to practice history-taking and physical exam skills
- Giving one large-group lecture on components of the patient care encounter
- Conducting one-on-one practice and assessment sessions with first-year medical students
- Providing formative feedback on written and oral patient histories from students
- Participating in course planning meetings (approximately 5) with the Course Director

Physician (MD or DO degree), physician assistant, or nurse practitioner; active clinical practice that includes history-taking and physical examination skills; strong interest in medical student education; schedule flexibility during the course. Clinical skills educators are not expected to be available full-time during the course, but are expected to be available on at least five half-days (8AM-12PM or 1PM-5PM) between August 8th and August 19th. To be eligible for this position, a faculty member must be appointed to a School of Medicine department.

The course meets in blocks of 3 consecutive weeks every 8 weeks throughout the year for a total of 18 sessions.
